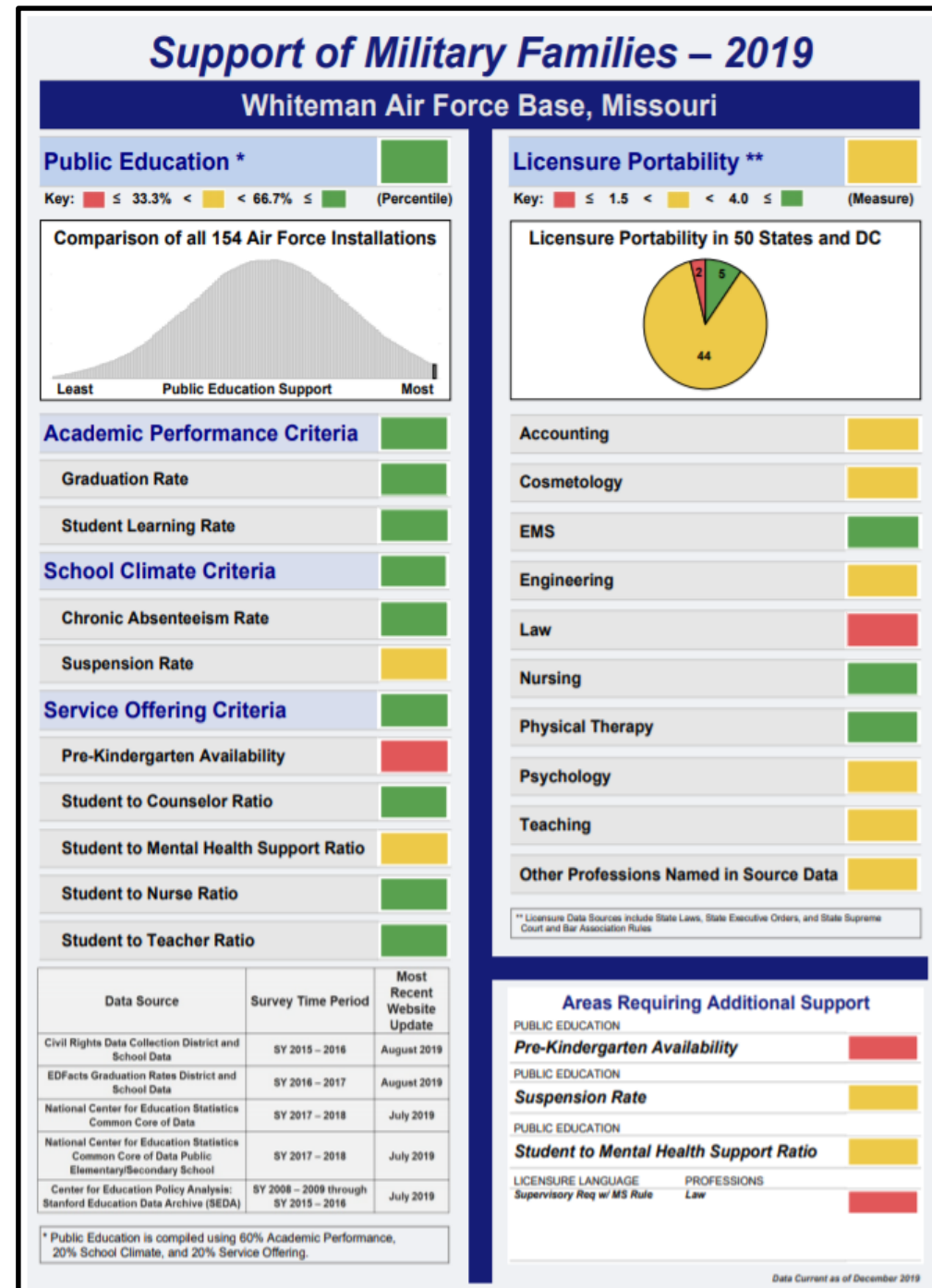

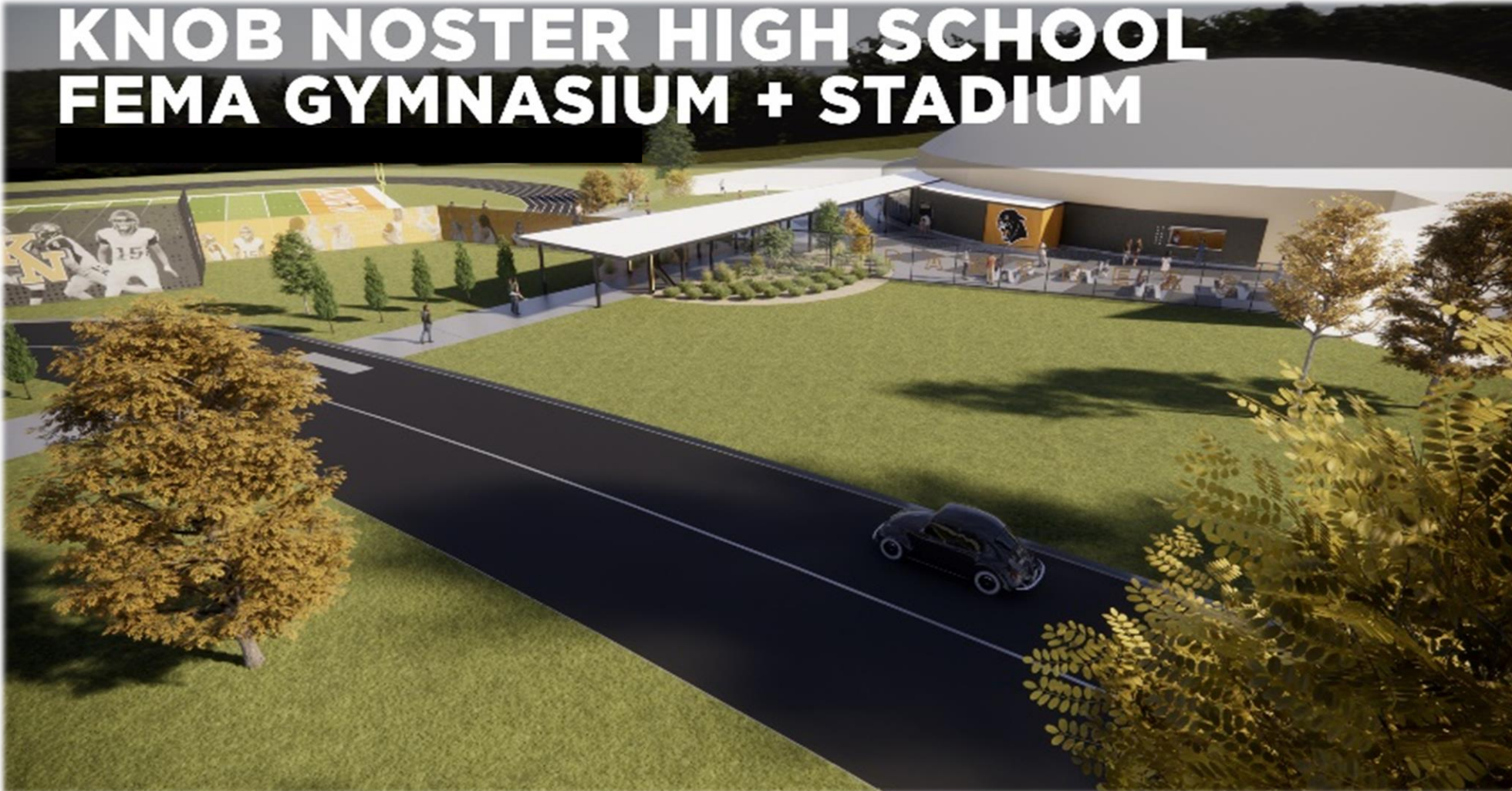

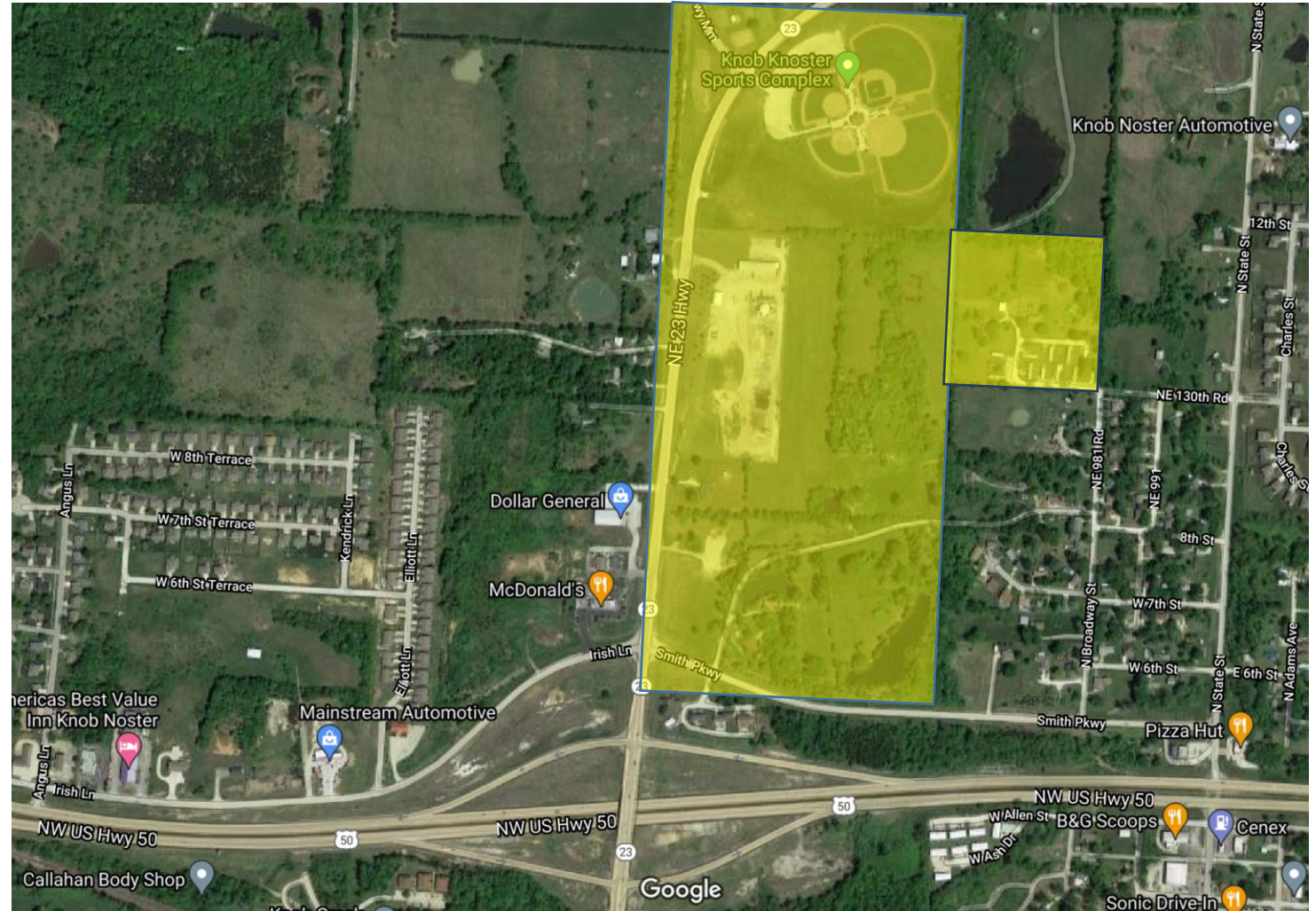

On behalf of the military-connected students of Whiteman AFB and their families, please accept this letter of endorsement for the proposed Knob Noster High School Innovation Campus. Our Service Secretaries and Service Chiefs have prioritized the quality of public education institutions that serve military installations. That message has been received clearly at Whiteman AFB. The proposed project responds to this call to action by enhancing PreK-12 education and bolstering mission-centric workforce development.

This project will enhance military value by providing unique opportunities to (1) place veterans in education-related jobs as they transition to civilian service, and (2) extend the district's career and technical programs to transitioning service members through adult learning opportunities. The proposal also includes a variety of quality-of-life amenities that enhance military value, including expansion of preschool activities, creating indoor and outdoor joint-use recreation facilities for adults/youth/service-member functions, and establishing a performing arts facility capable of hosting military functions. The district is also leveraging this project with residential developers to establish critical privatized housing capacity to support the anticipated population increase associated with the proposed B-21 beddown.

The district has witnessed a 25% growth over the last five years and the student population currently exceeds maximum capacity, with mobile units being used to hold classes. The capacity issues will become even more problematic from growth associated with the proposed B-21 mission. Absent this grant funding, the district has little to no likelihood to accomplish the proposed project, which will result in these issues going unmet.

KNPS is one of only a handful of heavily-military-impacted school districts in the nation, having a military-student population that is 70% connected to the Whiteman AFB mission. The district employs 280 educators, of which nearly 50% are connected to current or prior military service. KNPS embraces its opportunity and responsibility to lead innovation for the military families of our nation.
